In PATH North Dakota, the Chafee Foster Care Independence Program offers such support. Unconditional commitment to working with families and children is a key component to the program. Foster families play an active role in making sure that the individualized needs of the foster youth are met.

In order to ensure that all these needs were met, PATH North Dakota hired Kelly Mitchell, Independent Living Skills Coordinator, for the region. She brings a background in Sociology and a passion for

working with children and families to these positions.

As the Independent Living Skills Coordinator, Kelly coordinates individualized independent living skills plans that she and the youth create together. The youth is then responsible for achieving the goals that have been set with the assistance of the youth's personal support system.

Kelly notes that the success of the program comes from being youth-driven and individualized. "We work towards goals that the youth want to achieve and skills that the youth want to learn about."

Another strong and unique aspect of the pro-

gram is the ability to work with the youth until they are 21, and if they are working towards their goals and in college, PATH can work with them until they are 23. Knowing that continual support is available gives graduating youth the necessary sustainability to overcome obstacles that may occur during these transitional years.

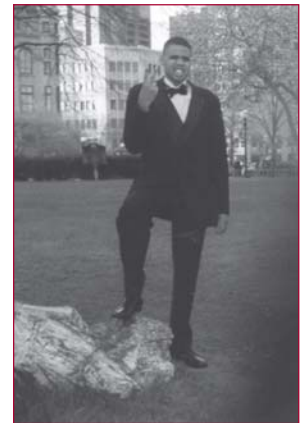

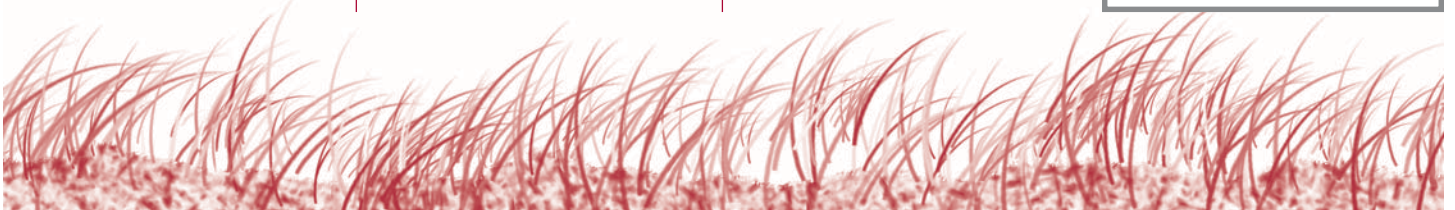

A TIME OF TRANSITION FOR PATH

The PATH transitions began in February, when Tim Plant announced that he would be leaving as Chief Executive Officer. Tim has accepted a position as Executive Director of St. David's School, which is a Twin Cities leader in early childhood education. Tim's last day with the agency was March 16. Tim had been with PATH for eight years. During this time the organization grew both in terms of children served and in types of services provided. The PATH Inc. Board of Directors recognized Tim for his service, at their March 30 meeting. (Please see letter from Tim elsewhere in PATH Prints.)

The PATH Inc. Board of Directors asked me to serve as interim CEO while the Board and staff sort out some issues related to the relationships between PATH state programs and the national organization. I had previously served as Executive Director of PATH, and had worked the past year with the PATH Minnesota program. I am committed to serving in the interim role for 6 to 12 months, while the Board studies the issues and makes some decisions.

The PATH Inc. Board of Directors is also working on transition issues. The biggest issue revolves around how

the state programs relate to each other and to the national organization. Each state was incorporated as a separate non-profit corporation about four years ago. Since that time, the individual state programs have become a little different in the types of services provided and their organizational structure. This sometimes makes it difficult for the National Support Center to meet the individual state needs. The question for the PATH Inc. Board is whether it should still serve as a "parent organization" to the states, or whether PATH should be reorganized with more of a "federated" or "association" model.

Each of the states is committed to staying a part of PATH. The states also share a commitment to foster parent participation, quality services, and innovation and creativity in serving children. The state Boards and the National Board are working together to discern whether we might operate better with a different type of structure. The PATH Inc Board has met monthly the past three months. Its next meetings are scheduled for June 22 in Minneapolis, and August 10 in Fargo.



A FOSTER YOUTH'S ULTIMATE GIFT

When Justin came to live with the Szczyrbak foster family of Moose Lake, MN in June, 2004, he was motivated to stay on track to finish high school. He wanted to start adulthood on a positive note. Throughout his senior year at Barnum High School, Justin made friends easily and touched many lives. He was also a valuable member of the Barnum Football Team. The Szczyrbaks became very attached to Justin. He was like an older brother to Kevin and Jennie's younger children. With the support and encouragement of his family, foster family, friends, etc., Justin successfully achieved his high school diploma on June 3, 2005. I specifically remember seeing his mother, Karla, glowing with pride at his graduation party at the Szczyrbaks' home.

Sadly, on February 16, 2007, Justin died in a car

accident. He is remembered by many as a kind, generous, and hard working young man with a great sense of humor. Justin's family shared that he was able to help others once more through the donation of his organs in five successful transplants, including his heart, pancreas, liver, and both kidneys.

The following excerpt was taken from a message from Jennie Szczyrbak about Justin: "Justin was someone who would give you the shirt off his back if you wanted it. He gave very generously in many ways. It's been amazing to see the amount of people he has touched in the short amount of time he's lived in Moose Lake. Getting to know him was truly a gift. His final gift to the people in this world was the one he gave to families in need of organ donations. I'm sure he would be very happy to know he played a part in saving people's lives."

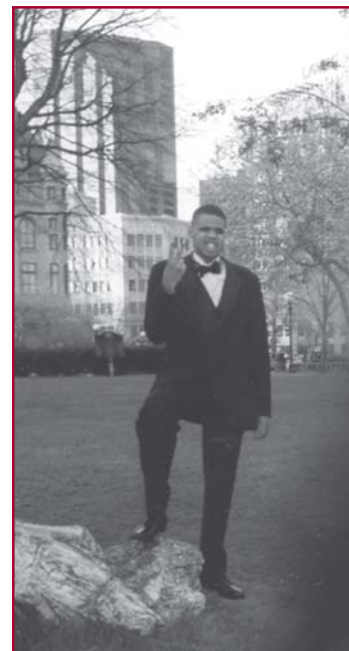

A BIG CONGRATS!

Congratulations to PATH foster youth, Ernie! Ernie has been nominated and awarded as Student of the Year from the STEPS Program, which stands for Specialized Transition Employment Planning Service. It's a secondary transition program for students age 14-18. They are placed at educational sites within the community to work on Individual Education Plan (IEP) goals in the five transition areas. The program is primarily focused on career exploration and entry level work experience and participation is concurrent with high school enrollment. Ernie was chosen out of 100 other youths with disabilities from the program.



Ernie ... Student of the Year!

Ernie is autistic and mentally handicapped and has been in PATH's care since December 1989. He has achieved many successes and continues to be strong and determined. This year he graduates on his IEP goals and will continue in foster care in the Transition to Independence (TTI) program. TTI is a St. Paul public school community-based transition program for special needs students between the ages of 18 to 21 years old. These individuals are no longer involved in a traditional high school program and have not fully attained the transition goals in their IEP. Areas of focus include: Jobs and job training, recreation and leisure, home living, community participation, and post secondary training and learning opportunities.

Joyce Levingston, his foster mother, requested this space in PATH Prints and she said that Ernie would be thrilled to see this and keep it forever in his life book. Mary Petersen, Ernie's social worker, says: "Joyce and Ernie have formed a team that has brought love and learning to both of them, and have risen to the challenges presented by Ernie's 'path' in life. They are quite an example to all of us!" Indeed they are, congratulations Ernie, you deserve it!

PATH OFFICE UPDATES

COLORADO

There is going to be a significant change in the Colorado business plan. Specifically, PATH Colorado is ending its internal foster care program and moving toward a service provision model, wherein they will begin wrapping the treatment services/model around existing county homes in the Denver metro area. This will, among other things, enable PATH Colorado to serve more children, as we will not be confined by the limitations of our internal foster parent resources. We are in the early stages of exploring the need for this service.

MINNESOTA

There was a great outcome for the Crisis Nursery fundraiser. This is an annual event where community members come together to show their support of the Nursery's work in Wright County. This year nearly 250 people attended and nearly \$37,000 was raised! Congratulations to all who helped put it together and make it such a success. This event

supports the service delivery to hundreds of local families.

PATH Minnesota's operations in Rochester are quickly growing. There are now 60 children in care. To provide accommodation for this significant growth, the Rochester office moved into a new space and an open house was held in May with foster parents, staff, and county staff members in attendance.

PATH Minnesota would like to specially acknowledge Donna Ennis who was recognized as a Native American Woman in Leadership for her outstanding services to her community. Donna wanted to let everyone know that she couldn't do what she does without the support of the people she works with, including the foster families. "They make my job easier by having good cross-cultural skills and great diversity. Duluth PATH has 27 foster families and over 50 children in placement. Half of the families and children are Native American. I am proud to lead such a great group of people."

NORTH DAKOTA

PATH North Dakota has been especially fortunate to receive significant press in local newspapers. Highlights include:

Over Three Decades of Foster Parenting

The Lakota American, on May 9, 2007, featured Rich Holm for being a foster parent for 34 years. "Rich still has the same inner feelings now that he had back in 1973. He wonders, "Will the child fit in my home? Will we get along?" He accepts each new child as a challenge and offers them love, support, and encouragement. He sees that their basic needs are met and more!

Fostering Childhood

The Forum, on May 14, 2007, recognized Peter and Vicki Schmidt of West Fargo. They have been fostering children for more than 30 years. "I rent out my heart and I give myself, and sometime my heart is broken," Peter Schmidt said. "There are emotional highs and lows, but we can handle that."

Joe Huovinen lived with Peter and Vicki for a little

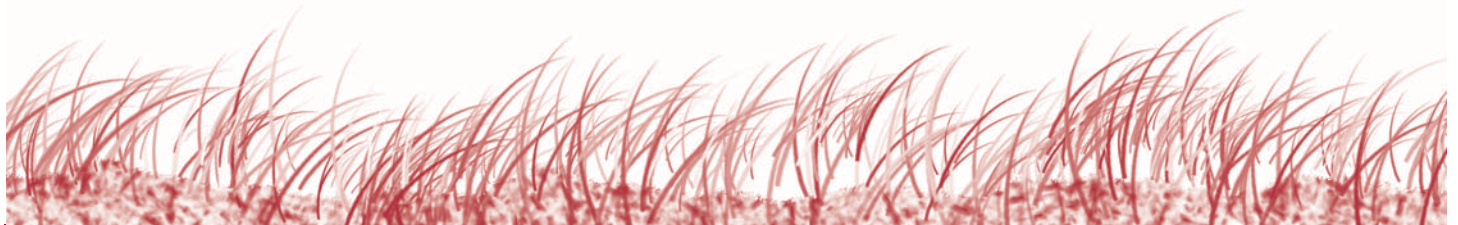
more than a year. He continues a relationship with them 10 years later. "They were a very positive influence in my life. The foster care system gave me stability, structure, a caring home." Huovinen said.

"We hope to inspire and engage many more individuals to take action in support of foster children and their families. There are so many ways a person can positively affect the life of a child in foster care."

WISCONSIN

For the first time in history, PATH Wisconsin has an official office in Milwaukee. At this site PATH Wisconsin will provide community based mental health care. An open house was held on April 17th. It was well-attended and referral sources came anxious to begin sending referrals.

Cindy O'Keefe and Amelia Franck Meyer presented at ISP's conference in England. PATH's services and programs received strong praise in England, and we look forward to many opportunities to work together in the future.
